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

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
EXAMINATIONS

Named after the hometown of Saint Marcellin Champagnat, Marlhes Restaurant is treasured by students, staff and the community.






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

The students were brilliant and thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity to get out of the class-room and explore life as a tradesperson.



SCOTT DARLOW

Darlow was born in Melbourne, Australia to Salvation Army parents, the second of four children, Darlow moved to Hong Kong at five years of age. He spent the next six years there attending Beacon Hill Primary School before returning to Melbourne to begin high school. Two years at Essendon Grammar were then followed by another move to Perth, Western Australia, where he attended Hollywood High School. After this, he moved back to Melbourne where he completed school at Strathmore High School.

Following on from high school, Darlow began a teaching degree at RMIT. During this time, he also worked in bars and pubs, including a two-year stint at Melbourne Hilton on the Park. Upon completion of his university studies, Darlow worked at three high schools and one primary school, teaching music. After two and a half years of full-time teaching, he resigned to focus on writing music, recording and touring.

On Thursday 02.06.22 our entire cohort were treated to a presentation by Scott Darlow as part of Reconciliation Week.

Scott is a 'First Nations' person and has toured nationally, headlining his own shows and also supporting Jimmy Barnes, Diesel, Jon Stevens, Eskimo Joe and many more.


Prior to being a full time artist, Scott was a high school teacher and for the last 10 years, Scott has used his music to connect students all over Australia.

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WSC Knitting Club.



BLACK OUT POETRY: VISIT THE LIBRARY TO JOIN IN THE FUN.



Like most things in literature, blackout poetry—also known as erasure poetry, redacted poetry, and a form of found poetry—has a complex history.

In fact, the earliest known blackout poetry examples hail from Benjamin Franklin's days. Ben's neighbor, Caleb Whiteford, would publish redacted versions of the paper, using puns flowing across the text to create new meaning in the pages.

Now, Whiteford was ahead of his time. This creative play with physical text would not resurface until the Dada movement (1915-1925), in which artists expressed surreal, absurd, and existential thoughts through the interplay of words and images. This interplay, commonly known as collaging, reignited a love for the physical play with language, encouraging poets to experiment with form and language simultaneously.

Science Talent Search fits closely with the Victorian Curriculum philosophy of teaching and learning. Premier's Reading Challenge

The Premiers' Reading Challenge encourages children and students to read a set number of books over the year and record their efforts online. Since the Challenge first began in 2005, more than 3 million students have read nearly 51 million books.

Tournament of Minds








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A note from, Ms Baker - Literacy Specialist
